

Overview of FY2020 - FY2024 CIP

- 205 Total Projects
- 96 with projected spending during FY2019 FY2024 Period
- 51 project deletions and 29 project additions from FY2019 CIP
- 100+ changes in project descriptions, funding sources, schedules and priorities
- \$245 Million in projected spending during FY2020-FY2024, from <u>all</u> sources
- Project Breakdown by Asset Category
 - 113 Building projects
 - 23 Complete Streets projects
 - 19 Parks & Open Space projects
 - 15 Sewer Projects
 - 10 Stormwater Projects
 - 10 Large Equipment projects


















